We have also launched several social campaigns and through this work have sought to present the true image of Muslims in the media. One of the things that has truly astounded me over the past year has been the unfaltering dedication of our staff, volunteers and key partners in the community. I can categorically say that this masjid could not function without the support of Allah and their dedication.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you who contribute through donations, kind words and du'a (supplication).

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their Annual Report together with the Financial Statements of Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre (the charitable company and the group) for the year ending 31 December 2019.

The Trustees affirm that the Annual Report and money related proclamations of the charitable company and the group consent to the current statutory prerequisites, the requirements of the charitable company and the group's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

#### Purposes and aims

The objects and principal activities of Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre (the charitable company and the group - GLMCC) are to advance the Islamic faith for the public benefit.

Home to a diverse community, our mission at GLMCC is simply Islam, to inspire, educate, and serve the people.

#### Ensuring our work delivers our aims

We review our aims, objectives and activities each year. This review looks at what we achieved and the outcomes of our work in the previous 12 months. The review looks at the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to those groups of people we are set up to help. The review also helps us to ensure that our aim, objectives and activities remained focused on our stated purposes.

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

#### The focus of our work

The focus of Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre (the charitable company and group) remains the advancement of the Islamic faith.

#### Grantmaking

Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre (GLMCC) reviews various organisations and individuals who support and deliver GLMCC's objects.

Potential recipients of grants paid by GLMCC are reviewed by GLMCC on a case by case basis depending upon the available resources of GLMCC.

#### STRATEGIC REPORT

#### Achievements and performance – our services for you

### How our activities deliver public benefit

The Trustees routinely review the activities of Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre (GLMCC) to ensure they continue to reflect the objectives and aims of the charity and provide an overall benefit to the public. In carrying out this review the Trustees continue to consider the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and its supplementary public guidance on the advancement of religion for the public benefit.

Our main activities and who we try to help are described below.

#### 1. YOUTH AND SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

Every week at GLMCC a number of social activities are held to inspire the overall development of the Muslim community in a spiritual and nurturing setting.

#### 1.1 Cricket

GLMCC held a six-week All Stars Cricket Programme in conjunction with the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) for

primary school children. The ECB also facilitated training for volunteers delivered by a trained female coach and awarded all of the children who participated with certificates upon completion of the cricket programme.

#### 1.2 Basketball

Sisters' weekly basketball sessions are organised by GLMCC and held off-site. The weekly sessions promote the coming together of sisters in the community in an environment which is focused on fitness, activity and sports. Our weekly basketball helps to strengthen sisterhood through fun and light-hearted competition.

#### 1.3 Football

This year saw the launch of our weekly football club in association with the Football Association (FA). Young people are given the opportunity to practice and improve their football skills under the coaching of positive role models. Our football academy instils passion, perseverance and resilience into the young people we work with.

#### 1.4 Muay Thai Thaiboxing

Our weekly kickboxing class with a trained professional instructor encourages young people to focus on their fitness, confidence and self-defence in an energetic, fast-paced and enjoyable environment. Through holding sports-based activities in the masjid, youth are able to appreciate the multipurpose function of a masjid within a community. Not only does the masjid afford them the opportunity to strengthen skills they are passionate about, it also provides them with a positive, encouraging and spiritual setting in which they feel welcomed and appreciated.

#### 1.5 GLM Youth - Summer Programme

Over the summer of 2019 the youth team organised a total of 22 events including workshops, interactive discussions and an exclusive mental health campaign.

The youth team focus on five main areas:

- Islamic education.
- Social activities.
- Careers and future planning.
- Mental health and wellbeing.
- Gangs and violence.

The youth team aim to inspire youth to become more well-rounded and thoughtful individuals who champion both their Islamic and British identity. GLM Youth recognise the challenges and pressures that young people face in today's society and therefore prioritise campaigning and holding events on mental health, personal development and gang culture. By teaming up with religious guides, medical professionals, counsellors and mentors, GLM Youth offers a unique system of support and inspiration to its services users.

The youth of the community were brought together through dynamic discussions in which they had the freedom to bring up questions and struggles they had in a non-judgemental and supportive environment. Furthermore, a number of sleepovers, activity days, camping trips, life-skills workshops and sports based activities were organised to ensure that the youth within the community were offered a range of enjoyable, engaging and fun events to take part in during the school holidays. The large range of social events provided youth with the opportunity to make new friends in a positive environment. Over 300 youths have benefited from programmes held by GLM Youth with overwhelming positive feedback.

#### 1.6 Scouts

Our scouts group (GLM 309 Scouts) is the second largest in the region with over 130 children registered and over 200 on the waiting list. GLM Scouts held the first ever Muslim jamboree, raised over £30,000 for Syrian refugees and have won regional awards. At GLMCC, along with our rigorous educational programmes, we aim to interweave a number of other activities throughout the week in order to serve both the intellectual and social needs of the community.

Scouts offers young people the opportunity to develop their life-skills, confidence and interests in an environment which is guided by positive role-models. In recent months scouts have contributed towards GLMCC's homeless campaign by working on building sleep pods for the homeless

#### 2. WELFARE SERVICES

Islam is a religion that considers a person holistically, to ensure that they are in the best of health spiritually, physically and mentally. The spirit of Islam is one that supports a person's progress and wellbeing in every sphere of life and society. For this reason GLMCC is at the forefront of developing its welfare services with over 12 services currently running in aid of the community.

#### 2.1 Foodbank

GLMCC's food bank is a community supported initiative helping over 30 people per week with over 70% of service users not from the Islamic faith. The masjid has partnered with a local supermarket, Morrisons, who hold a food bin in store which fills up every week. A large number of public donations, including donations from schools around the city, are distributed to those in need within the community. This year we have also placed food bins in local supermarkets and now receive grants for our food bank which has reduced the reliance on donations.

#### 2.2 Counselling

In the modern age we are beginning to witness a drastic increase in psychological and mental health issues. To address this phenomenon GLMCC works with both a male and female counsellor to offer professional counselling and support to the Muslim community. In 2019 GLMCC has teamed up with a male GP for the sole purpose of offering counselling to men in the community. Too often men are stigmatised for suffering with their mental health and they therefore suffer in silence as their conditions quietly worsen. To alter this reality, GLMCC encourage those who are suffering to step forward and seek help so that they are empowered to re-direct their lives.

#### 2.3 Zakah Service

Zakah is an obligatory charitable tax for Muslims entailing that 2.5% of surplus wealth is donated every year. A number of Muslims tend to send their zakah abroad to help those suffering in third world impoverished and warstricken countries. At GLMCC we recognise the duty and responsibility we have to prioritise the needs of those who are suffering at home first. A number of Muslims are living in dire and vulnerable conditions, unable to meet the demands of daily life. In 2019 we have employed an in-house case worker who approves approximately 60 cases annually. Alhamdulillah, we distribute £60K-£80K every year to help those most in need with finding accommodation, paying rent, food-bank tokens, new furniture, household items, travel expenses, clothing and other essentials.

#### 2.4 Funeral Service

The GLM Funeral Service (GLMFS) is a 24-hour funeral service with full in-house equipment. GLMFS offers practical support to the bereaved family from the moment a loved one passes away until the burial takes place.

#### 2.5 Imam Q & A

The Imam Q & A operates four times a week providing hundreds of hours of advice every year. GLMCC imams are available to answer your questions and offer individualised spiritual advice.

#### 2.6 Knife Bank

In 2019 over 80 weapons including a bullet were surrendered. Local media reported on the findings and GLMCC continue to advocate for a reduction in knife-crime and street violence.

#### 2.7 Coffee Morning

Our weekly coffee morning sees an attendance of over 50 women. A number of women in attendance don't have access to safe spaces and, therefore, coffee morning offers them an opportunity to develop their faith, friendships and wellbeing.

#### 2.8 Street Watch

GLMCC is working with West Midlands Police to help deter crime in the local area. Street Watch volunteers patrol the area in groups providing a high visibility presence which has been shown to reduce the onset of crime. Volunteers are given free training and are only asked to spare a couple of hours a month.

#### 2.9 Joint Pain Clinic

GLMCC has partnered with a specialist orthopaedic surgeon to hold a monthly musckuloskeletal and joint pain clinic. A range of issues such as joint problems, sports injuries, fractures and arthritis can be discussed in 15-minute consultations.

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#### 2.10 Food Kitchen

In the last year we have partnered with the popular foodchain, Greggs, to provide meals for the homeless across Birmingham. The food kitchen operates three times a week, distributing 30 meals per session.

#### 2.11 Immigration Surgery

GLMCC is working with the Home Office to offer a free fortnightly immigration surgery. The service is completely confidential, offering guidance to those who are facing obstacles with regards to their immigration status.

#### 2.12 Cancer Support Group

Working with Macmillan Cancer Support, GLMCC hold a monthly lunch and meet-up for those affected by cancer. Qualified professionals are present to support those who need advice, support or someone to talk to.

#### 2.13 Legal Surgery

GLMCC has partners with Aman Solicitors who provide free weekly legal advice onsite. They offer support in issues related to immigration, civil litigation and landlord or tenant disputes.

#### 2.14 The Big Elderly Meet-up

Our monthly social gathering for the elderly sees an attendance of approximately 50 people each session. The gathering gives our elders a chance to make new friends, enjoy some good food and have a relaxing afternoon with members of the community.

### 3. DAWAH/OUTREACH SERVICES

This year we have created a new dawah team to focus on expanding our dawah/outreach activities. Our dawah team seeks to create awareness about the true teachings of Islam and educate our community and wider society. This is done through a range of activities including talks, khutbas (Friday prayer sermons), school visits, open days, exhibitions, Islamic conferences, weekend courses, writing and much more.

Additionally, GLMCC not only favours its own progress, but also seeks to be in the service of other mosques, local organisations and university Islamic Societies. As a result of decades of experience and growth we are now at a stage where we can share our good practice by offering training, consultations and support to mosques around the country. Currently, we support eight mosques with their dawah (presentation of Islam) and governance frameworks as well as delivering hundreds of sermons across a number of mosques throughout the year.

#### 3.1 Summer Conference

The year 2019 saw the comeback of GLMCC's popular Summer Conference. The conference hosted notable international speakers from across the Western world and thousands of attendees from all over the UK. The topic of the conference this year was 'I Choose Islam', leaving attendees inspired and empowered to practice their faith in the 21st century. Lectures and workshops covered themes such as unity, youth, mental health, respecting parents, being a balanced Muslim, spirituality among the salaf (pious predecessors) and a day in the life of the prophet (peace be upon him).

#### 3,2 Winter Conference

GLMCC held its 10th annual winter Knowledge Conference in 2019. Scholars of the highest calibre from the Muslim world travel to the UK to teach dedicated attendees from across Europe the fundamentals of Islam. This year, topics included manners and morals in Islam, business transactions, how to pray correctly and Aqeedah (theology). The conference gives Muslims in the West the opportunity to connect with classical methods of studying Islam, in order to appreciate the vast history and scholarship across the tradition. Both summer and winter conferences are some of the most greatly anticipated events of the year.

#### 3.3 Intensive Weekend Courses

At a subsidised rate, GLMCC offer exclusive quarterly weekend courses with world renowned lecturers. We offer the community a unique opportunity to learn through these structured courses with some of the best Islamic educators in a way that is accessible for everyone.

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#### 3.4 Open Days and Annual Gala Dinner

In 2019 GLMCC invited the community and its partners to various events to showcase our work. Sharing impactful stories from service beneficiaries, activities for children and presentations were delivered to those who visited.

#### 3.5 School Visits

In 2019 we hosted a number of school trips in conjunction with Exhibition Islam to introduce hundreds of students across the city to the core beliefs and practices of Muslims, along with a guided tour of the mosque.

#### 3.6 Exhibition Islam

Exhibition Islam is a world renowned exhibition company that works in partnership with GLMCC. The company has toured the world with its Islamic exhibitions and its work helps to promote a greater understanding of Islam by utilising alternative educational resources. Rare Islamic artefacts are used to deliver professional museum style exhibitions and to pay homage to the rich cultural heritage of Muslims. In the past two decades Exhibition Islam has attracted over 1.3 million visitors, establishing its name as the leading Islamic exhibition provider in the world. Exhibitions have been held at over 1,300 venues across the UK including Buckingham Palace. A number of exhibitions have also taken place overseas in countries including Denmark, Qatar and South Africa. At an exclusive exhibition held in Norway, the Queen of Norway attended to inaugurate the event.

#### 3.7 Masjid Outreach

We empower many masaajid (mosques) with speakers, joint statements, shared best practice, etc.

#### 3.8 Interfaith Work

We hold regular visits to the masjid from other faith groups. We also attend various interfaith working groups.

#### 3.9 GLM TV

We stream hundreds of talks online every year and we have over 100K followers on YouTube and growing!

#### 3.10 Regular Talks and Khutbah

We deliver over 250 talks and khutbahs across the country each year.

#### 3.11 Articles and Social Media

We regularly write articles and social media posts addressing issues pertinent to the Muslim community.

#### 4. EDUCATION

The vision of the Education department is to promote the pristine knowledge of Islam to learners of all ages by developing dynamic individuals who can benefit society by contextualizing their understanding of the religion. We provide a range of educational services and classes, catering to all ages and abilities.

These include the following.

- Online classed conducted over Zoom.
- Over 60 onsite classes a week.
- A weekly children's evening school (Madrasah).
- A monthly Budding Believers Club for children.
- An annual children's summer school.

#### 4.1 Madrasah

The GLMCC Madrasah is an Islamic Supplementary Evening School with over 400 students currently in attendance. We offer Islamic Studies, Quran recitation and Quran memorisation classes in a fun yet focused setting. The environment we have created is one that is caring and secure for young people. We endorse excellent manners and nurture what we hope will be future leaders who will positively contribute to British society. By working collaboratively with a child's best interest at heart, we aspire to produce successful, happy and confident Muslims. Together, we are able to offer a unique education to our children.

#### 4.2 Education Classes

Our Education department is committed to ensure that all learners at GLMCC study with an ethos of high aspirations. With over 60 classes running per week we instil this through focusing on academic achievement, personal development and character refinement. Our curriculum is broad and innovatively designed to ensure that students are engaged and inspired. We employ over 50 teachers to deliver classes, seminars and specialised courses on a range of topics including theology, Islamic jurisprudence and Qur'anic exegesis. Though our classes are largely faith based we are keen to develop dynamic and well-rounded individuals who can benefit society through the skill of being able to contextualise their understanding of Islam.

#### 4.3 Budding Believers Club

One of our most popular initiatives at the masjid is the Budding Believer's Club. The club was established in 2013 for primary school children and has since been running once a month on a Sunday morning. Currently, sessions are delivered to over 150 children by a brilliant team of qualified teachers and experienced volunteers. The children arrive eager to enter into lively sessions in which love for Islam is inspired through creativity, discussions and role-play

#### 5. MASJID ACTIVITIES

The primary function of a masjid is to serve as a place of worship. We do this through the five daily prayers, the Friday Jumuah (congregational prayer), the many activities over Ramadan and our annual Eid salahs. Our congregation is spectacularly vibrant with a diverse range of ages, races and backgrounds.

#### 5.1 Five Daily Prayers

Salah (prayer) is one of the five pillars of Islam. At GLMCC over 200 worshipers attend every day for each of the five daily prayers.

#### 5.2 Jumuah (Friday) Prayers

GLMCC hosts a congregation of over 3,000 people every Friday for the weekly sermon and prayer. Our imams (clerics) deliver insightful speeches, educating our community and addressing key issues.

### 5.3 Ramadan Activities

In Ramadhan, Muslims around the world fast for an entire month. From dawn until dusk Muslims abstain from food, drink and marital relations. Every night in Ramadhan over 2,000 people visit GLMCC to perform the night prayer, Taraweeh. During Ramadhan, the masjid also serves food (Iftar) every night to those who have been fasting, with an average of 350 people collectively. On some of the busiest nights we host over 1,000 attendees for Iftar and Suhoor (pre-dawn meal). We also accommodate an average of 60 people for seclusion in the mosque (itikaf) for the last ten days of Ramadan.

#### 5.4 Celebrate Eid

GLMCC is the founder of Celebrate Eid, an event which has established itself as the largest outdoor Islamic event in Europe, with over 80,000 people in attendance. Over a quarter of Birmingham's Muslim population come together to share in the festivities, food and fun! A number of mosques across Birmingham support the Celebrate Eid event with their imams and congregations attending to celebrate the joyous day. Local politicians, West Midlands Police and respected imams work together to facilitate, support and enliven this celebratory day for the Muslim community.

#### 6. HUMANITARIAN WORK AND SOCIAL CAMPAIGNS

#### 6.1 Task Force

In just six years Task Force GLM (TFGLM) has raised over £6.6 million supporting thousands of people across the world. The team is run entirely by a group of volunteers who work tirelessly to deliver aid in just under twenty countries. TFGLM engages with the entire community by holding a number of events to showcase its work, educate and raise awareness on global crises. A number of fundraising dinners are organised by the team over the year attracting hundreds of people with tens of thousands raised for humanitarian causes at every event.

In 2019 alone TFGLM has raised £1.6 million for humanitarian causes. On the busiest night of Ramadhan earlier this year — the 27th night — an outstanding £400,000 was raised within a couple of hours. At GLMCC we aim to promote the altruistic essence of Islam by serving the needs of humanity to the best of our ability. Our humanitarian

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arm provides life-saving support to orphans and those in need across the globe. Key TFGLM projects include an orphanage in Lebanon, the Syrian Bread Project producing tonnes of bread for displaced Syrians, the Winter Food Parcel programme, water filtration plants, water wells, qurbanis and more.

#### 6.2 Syrian Relocation Programme

In 2013 the British government committed to resettle 20,000 Syrian refugees through the Syrian Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme. Those in the direst need were to be prioritised in this scheme. Alhamdulillah, TFGLM has helped to relocate a Syrian family to the UK through this scheme and was responsible for funding their housing, core needs and ensuring they settle into the community. TFGLM look forward to supporting and welcoming more families in the future inshaAllah.

#### 6.3 Annual Social Campaigns - 2019 Social Campaign 1: Winter Freeze

Last Winter at GLMCC we opened up our doors to shelter the homeless. For four weeks during freezing weather conditions we provided free food, snacks and hot drinks as well as a warm place to stay overnight. An average of fifteen people were fed and homed every night with up to twenty-five people on the coldest and busiest nights. Additionally, food-parcels were distributed across the city centre with hundreds fed and given clothing and blankets over the period. We were also able to support ten people in getting off the streets and into housing. We aim to inspire God's (Allah's) consciousness in the hearts and minds of people. We hope to do this by following the prophet's example of not only caring for our brothers in faith but also our brothers in humanity.

#### 6.4 Annual Social Campaigns - 2019 Social Campaign 2: Environmental Campaign

Our next campaign of the year was an environmental campaign. The accumulation of plastic waste has an incredibly adverse effect on the environment, putting the lives of living creatures at risk. On average, every night during Ramadan, 800 plastic water bottles would be distributed to our congregation during lftar and evening prayers. This resulted in a colossal amount of plastic waste. To counter this we developed our very own reusable water bottles available to purchase onsite. This initiative dramatically reduced the plastic waste while also enabling us to educate our congregation on the harms and dangers that the frequent use of plastic presents. Many other mosques followed suit and we now hope that this initiative will result in more environmentally-friendly Ramadans in the future.

#### 6.5 Annual Social Campaigns - 2019 Social Campaign 3: Anti-Knife Crime

Earlier this year GLMCC ran an anti-knife crime campaign. The campaign began with a hard-hitting youth flash-mob event. Upon completing their Friday prayer, congregation members left the mosque to be greeted by over 50 youths lined up outside the mosque and adjacent streets holding up placards with heart-breaking stories and horrific statistics related to the relentless nature of knife crime. In an effort to raise awareness on knife crime in the wider community, the campaign saw extensive positive media coverage from the BBC, ITV News, The Birmingham Mail, Free Radio and others.

#### 7. MEDIA ENGAGEMENT

Following the catastrophic events of the early 2000s, Islamophobic attitudes towards Muslims have continued to rise. Though Muslims have largely been misrepresented and stigmatised by some of the mainstream media we recognised the imperative responsibility we hold to actively counter such narratives. By working together with organisations such as the Muslim Council of Britain we are able to improve media perception and engagement with Muslims in the UK. Using our own voice to share the positive work and ideals that we are committed to, we are empowered to shape our own narrative and speak for ourselves.

In the last year, numerous articles have been written on GLMCC by various media outlets including CNN, Sky News, the BBC, The Birmingham Mall, Metro, The Daily Telegraph, The Guardian and ITV news. These articles highlight the incredible work that GLMCC promotes and oversees, inviting the greater public to engage with Muslim communities. We have received a range of positive feedback from non-Muslim readers who are inspired by our work and initiatives, voicing their support for our campaigns. We have a large online presence with over 750,000 Facebook followers and over 100,000 YouTube subscribers which enables us to share our pioneering work with a large audience. We have had over a dozen media appearances on ITV News, the BBC, Eman Channel, Channel 5 and the Islam Channel. Additionally, we regularly take part in radio interviews for channels such as BBC WM, Heart FM, Unity FM and Drivetime. We hope that by continuing our efforts to promote positive media engagement with Muslims we will empower British Muslims to practice their faith confidently, safely and with the aspiration to serve their community.

#### STRATEGIC REPORT - FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### **Financial position**

The consolidated Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31 December 2019 shows group incoming resources of £3,088,446 (2018: £4,716,565) and group resources expended of £5,487,838 (2018: £2,514,922), generating a deficit of expenditure over income totalling £2,399,392 (2018: surplus of income over expenditure totalling £2,201,643).

As a result, GLMCC's group net assets have decreased from £6,021,907 as at 31 December 2018 to £3,622,515 as at 31 December 2019.

Included within group assets as at 31 December 2018 was the purchase of a current asset investment property which was acquired during the year ended 31 December 2018 at a cost of £1,655,210. This property had been acquired in order to support the advancement of the Islamic faith outside of Birmingham and was donated by GLMCC during the year ended 31 December 2019 to a charitable trust.

#### Investment policy and performance

GLMCC has various purpose-built rooms accessible to let with shared kitchen and WC. This is solely aimed at single males. Every so often, GLMCC procures out its Community Hall and different regions of the site. Rental income from these facilities for the period added up to £32,168 (2018: £36,146) and was utilised to subsidise the charities activities.

#### Principal funding sources

The charity's main source of income is voluntary donations. During the year £2,645,088 (2018: £4,301,903) was raised through such donations. Of this source of income, £1,792,177 (2018: £1,813,750) were restricted funds to be applied for in specific areas of the charity's work. Details of the restricted funds and their purpose can be found in note 20 to the financial statements.

#### Reserves policy

Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre recognises the importance of having reserves. These funds are freely available to spend on any of the charity's purposes and hence exclude restricted funds. They will be used to mitigate significant falls in income or to take advantage of new opportunities.

Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre faces a number of risks that may result in the need to use the charity's reserves. Some of these include:

- Reduction in donations from congregation / members of the public.
- Unexpected refurbishment costs in relation to the listed building from which the charity operates.
- External factors impacting the charity, such as National Living Wage increases or increasing utility bills.

Reserves are represented by the fund balances as disclosed in the Group balance sheet on page 21 of the financial statements.

The Group balance sheet shows unrestricted reserves (reserves that do not carry any restrictions on how they can be used) of £2,806,917 as at 31 December 2019 (2018: £4,730,305). In assessing our level of free reserves as 31 December 2019 we also exclude unrestricted fixed assets totalling £2,407,425. This leaves free reserves of £125,020 as at 31 December 2019 (2018: free reserves totalling £393,198).

Green Lane Masjid and Community has set its reserves at approximately four months operational expenditure. It is the Trustees view that this amount means the charity has a balanced approach between having funds available to run the charity on a day to day basis and keeping funds aside in case any of the risks mentioned above materialise The Trustees also believe this level of reserves provides the charity with adequate financial stability and the means to meet its charitable objectives for the future.

The level of reserves will be reviewed annually to ensure alignment with risks the charity faces.

#### Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charitable group has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they have continued to adopt the going concern basis concept in preparing the financial statements.

#### Principal risks and uncertainties

The Board of Trustees has responsibility for ensuring that there are effective risk management and systems of internal control in place to manage the charitable company and group's major risks and support the achievement of our strategic objectives.

The principal risks to the charitable company and group's objectives and how these are managed is set out below.

### Risk - financial performance and sustainability

Risk concerning financial performance and sustainability includes any significant reduction in fundraising due to economic conditions. This risks undermining our ability to meet the needs of our users and to meet our strategic aims.

Risk concerning financial performance and sustainability is managed by the holding of a significant value of reserves and a regular review of charity reserves to ensure these remain within the target set by the Trustees. Senior management and the Trustees also regularly review and scrutinise the charitable company's and group's short and medium-term financial position.

#### Risk - safeguarding of vulnerable and young people

Risk concerning the safeguarding of vulnerable and young people includes negligence in relation to safeguarding policies or when practice results in or contributes to serious harm or injury to a young person or vulnerable adult and damages GLMCC's reputation.

Risk concerning the safeguarding of vulnerable and young people is managed by safeguarding training for all employees working directly with vulnerable and young people.

#### Risk - information security

Risk concerning information security includes serious data protection or security failure which may result in legal and contractual issues, reputational damage and potential fines and loss of income.

Risk concerning information security is managed by having a structure in place for Data Protection Act (DPA) monitoring and compliance and by the routine testing of IT systems to identify any security weaknesses.

#### STRATEGIC REPORT - FUTURE PLANS

Our vision for the future is simple – to inspire the Islamic faith into the hearts of people.

The year ended 31 December 2019 has been a great year and we have seen some great successes.

Going forward we intend to expand, improve and develop on all of our current services, programmes and activities. Our focus is to educate, inspire and serve which will help us bridge gaps, increase understanding and tolerance and improve community relations. We are aware, however, that our plans are dependent upon the charitable group being able to continue to operate and come to terms with the impact of the 2020 covid-19 pandemic.

At the present time there are many unknown variables which makes forecasting the future results and impact on the charitable group very difficult. The Trustees recognise that the current situation is uncertain but they have considered the position of the charitable group both at present and for the future given the current information available.

The Trustees have considered the various income streams of the charitable group, anticipated costs, future cash flows and the various options available to them. There is no intention for the charitable group to cease activity.

We look forward to developing our structure, services and activities in 2020 by the permission of Allah SWT.

We thank Allah (swt) followed by the congregation, our donors, partners and the wider community for their support and look forward to the same spirit of co-operation in the coming year.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Constitution

Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre (GLMCC) is a company limited by guarantee and is constituted under a Memorandum of Association dated 2 April 2008 as amended by Special Resolution(s) dated 19 March 2012 and 20 April 2012 and was enlisted with the Charity Commission on 10 September 2008.

### Method of appointment or election of Trustees

New Trustees are elected by the membership of the charity and appointed for a term of three years. The serving Board of Trustees can co-opt further Trustees for a term of one year under the terms of the Articles of Association.

#### Policies adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

New Trustees undergo a briefing on their legal commitments under charity law, the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Management Committee and decision-making processes, the business plan and recent financial performance of the charity. New Trustees also meet key employees and other Trustees. Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate the undertaking of their role.

#### Organisational structure and decision making

The parent of the Group is Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre (GLMCC), a company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales and registered as charity in England and Wales with the Charity Commission.

The Group has three wholly owned subsidiaries, GLMCC Trading Limited, GLM Youth and Children Services Limited and GLIS Construction Limited, which are all incorporated in England and Wales. There are two charitable companies in the Group, GLM Educational Trust and Re-Enlighten, and Re-Enlighten is the intermediate parent of a wholly owned subsidiary company, Re-Enlighten Trading Limited. Following the year end, the group is reviewing the number of dormant entities within the group and is removing entities which are no longer required.

The nature of each subsidiary's business and a summary of each subsidiary's trading results and assets and liabilities for the year ended 31 December 2019 are disclosed in note 15 to the financial statements.

The overall management and control of the charitable group is the responsibility of the Trustees of GLMCC who give their time freely and receive no remuneration or other benefits for carrying out their role.

The Trustees meet on a fortnightly basis to make operational decisions relating to administration and management of the mosque and community centre.

Day to day responsibilities of the mosque and community centre have been delegated to the Chief Executive Officer. To assist in the smooth running of the charity, the Trustees have further delegated the responsibility of various functions and activities of the charity to a number of sub-committees. The heads of each of the sub-committees form the management committee, the Logistics and Operations Committee, and meet on a monthly basis to report feedback and make operational decisions.

#### **Key Management Remuneration**

In the trustees' opinion, the key management personnel of the charity responsible for the direction, control, running and operation of the charity on a day to day basis consists of the Board of Trustees and the Chief Executive Officer.

#### Key management personnel - trustees

All trustees give of their time freely and no trustee received remuneration during the year.

Details of trustees' expenses and related party transactions are disclosed in notes 12 and 22 to the financial statements.

## Key management personnel – chief executive officer

The pay of the charity's senior staff is reviewed annually and normally increased based upon the financial position of

the charity's finances and the cost of living in general.

#### Risk Management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charitable company and the group is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charitable company and the group, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

#### **Fundraising**

The majority of our income comes from voluntary donations from our supporters. Through the fundraising efforts of our staff, volunteers and supporters we are generating the financial resources to enable us to provide our services.

We have a wide portfolio of fundraising activities to generate voluntary donations towards the services we provide. Our Board of Trustees is deeply committed to building relationships and trust with our supporters and is committed to the strengthening of oversight and assurance concerning our fundraising programmes and in ensuring compliance and best practice in these areas.

We are particularly aware of the need to protect vulnerable individuals in any fundraising we undertake. Our vulnerable persons policy sets out the standards we commit to meet.

We continue to be committed to addressing any expression of dissatisfaction on the part of our supporters and to examining ways to improve the levels of our service to them.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## GENERAL INFORMATION SECTION AND BASIS OF PREPARING THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre (GLMCC) is a company limited by guarantee and is registered in England and Wales. Its company and charity registered numbers and registered office are shown on page 15 of these financial statements. Its principal activity is detailed in the trustees' report.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities reporting their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective from 1 January 2019 (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

GLMCC meets the definition of a public entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historic cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy and the financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charitable company, rounded to the nearest £1.

The Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) and the Balance Sheet consolidate the Financial Statements of the charitable company and its subsidiary undertakings. The results of the subsidiary undertakings are consolidated on a line by line basis.

No separate SOFA has been presented for the charitable company alone as permitted by section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

#### INCOME

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charitable company has entitlement to the funds, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Gifts in kind donated for distribution are included at valuation and recognised as income when they are distributed to the projects. Gifts donated for resale are included as income when they are sold. Donated facilities are included at the value the charitable company where this can be qualified and a third party is bearing the cost. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

Donated services or facilities, which comprise donated services, are included in income at a valuation which is an estimate of the financial cost borne by the donor where such a cost is quantifiable and measurable. No income is recognised where there is no financial cost borne by a third party.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Investment income is earned through holding assets for investment purposes such as holding cash on deposit and the letting or rooms for hire. It includes interest and rent. Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method and rent income is recognised as the charity's right to receive payment is established.

#### **EXPENDITURE**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year-end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS**

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases.

Leasehold improvements

- over the period of the lease

Furniture, fittings and equipment

- 15% reducing balance method

Computer equipment

- 15% straight-line

Motor vehicles

- 10% straight-line method

#### **TAXATION**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### **EMPLOYEE BENEFITS**

When employees have rendered service to the charity, short-term employee benefits to which the employees are entitled are recognised at the undiscounted amount expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

For defined contribution schemes the amount charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in respect of pension costs and other post-retirement benefits is the contributions payable in the year. Differences between contributions payable in the year and contributions actually paid are shown as either accruals or prepayments in the balance.

#### **FUND ACCOUNTING**

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charitable company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charitable company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

### PENSION COSTS AND OTHER POST-RETIREMENT BENEFITS

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### **INVESTMENTS**

Investments in subsidiaries are valued at cost less provision for impairment.

Other investments, including current asset investments, are recognised initially at fair value which is normally the transaction price including transaction costs. Subsequently, they are measured at fair value with changes recognised in "net gains/(losses) on investments" in the Statement of Financial Activities if the investments are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **OPERATING LEASES**

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Benefits received and receivable as an incentive to sign an operating lease are recognised on a straight line basis over the period until the date the rent is expected to be adjusted to the prevailing market rate.

#### **FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS**

The charity only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at amortised cost.

#### **COMPANY STATUS**

The charitable company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the charitable company are the trustees named in the trustees' report. In the event of the charitable company being wound up the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the charitable company.

#### GOING CONCERN

These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, the validity of which is dependent upon the charitable group being able to continue to operate and come to terms with the impact of the 2020 covid-19 pandemic.

At the present time there are many unknown variables which makes forecasting the future results and impact on the charitable group very difficult. The trustees recognise that the current situation is uncertain but they have considered the position of the charitable group both at present and for a period of at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements.

The trustees have considered the various income streams of the charitable group, anticipated costs, future cash flows and the various options available to them. There is no intention for the charitable group to cease activity.

Based on the above, the trustees believe that it remains appropriate for the financial statements to be prepared on a going concern basis.

The financial statements do not include any adjustments which would result from the basis of preparation being inappropriate.

## JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following is a key source of estimation uncertainty.

Expenditure allocations: expenditure is apportioned where it relates to more than one cost category.

## **Purpose of Unrestricted Funds**

#### General fund

This fund represents the free funds of the charity that are not designated for particular purposes.

## Designated fund – Fixed Asset fund

This fund consists of unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees and represents funds spent by the charity on leasehold improvements and various furniture, fittings and equipment.

#### Designated fund - Faith fund

This fund represents funds applied by the charity to support the advancement of the Islamic faith in the UK, partly in Birmingham but predominantly outside of Birmingham.

This fund was expended in full as at 31 December 2019.

#### Africa fund

This fund consists of monies raised for humanitarian projects in Africa.

### Burma Appeal fund

This fund consists of monies raised to help Muslims being persecuted in Burma.

#### Celebrate Eid func

This fund consists of monies raised for Celebrate Eid project.

### Fidiyah fund

The Fidiyah fund raises money to feed the poor in expiation of missed fasts by individuals during the month of Ramadan.

## Foodbank fund

This fund consists of monies raised for the GLM Foodbank.

#### **Purpose of Restricted Funds**

#### **Funeral Service fund**

The Funeral Service fund consists of funds raised to help launch the funeral service project as part of our social welfare activities.

This fund was expended in full as at 31 December 2019.

### GLM Social Media fund

This fund consists of monies raised to support GLMCC Social Media initiatives.

#### Iftar func

The Iftar fund covers the costs of providing a light snack during Ramadan for people wishing to break their fast in the mosque.

#### Investing in the Hereafter fund

This fund consists of monies raised for projects acting as continuous charity.

#### Masjid Refurbishment and School Project fund

The Masjid Refurbishment and School Project fund is used to help finance refurbishment works to the community hall and the old masjid.

#### Online TV Project fund

This fund consists of funds to help launch GLM TV, a new website accessible to the public, who can watch live and pre-recorded content from Green Lane Masjid and Community Centre.

#### Orphans Appeal fund

The Orphans Appeal fund consists of funds raised to finance orphan sponsorship projects.

#### Palestine Appeal fund

The Palestine Appeal fund raises money to be used to assist the humanitarian crisis in the Occupied Territories.

#### Ourbani fund

Qurbani is the sacrificing of an animal on the day of Eid-Al-Adha. Funds raised are usually sent to various countries where the sacrifices of animals are undertaken and the meat distributed to the poor in those regions.

## Sadagah Jariyah Projects fund

This fund consists of monies raised for multimedia projects acting as continuous charity for donors.

#### School Library Fittings fund

The School Library Fittings fund is used to finance the installation of library fittings in newly refurbished parts of the charity's buildings.

#### Syria Appeal fund

This fund consists of funds raised to help the plight of the Syrian people in the recent civil conflict.

#### Zakat fund

Zakat is an obligation on all Muslims to pay 2.5% of their savings to charity. Funds raised must be spent in accordance with the Islamic Sharia guidelines and are not available to the charity for general purpose use.

## Purpose of Restricted Funds - continued

#### Zakat-ul-Fitr fund

Zakat-ul-Fitr is charity given to the poor at the end of fasting in the Islamic holy month of Ramadan. Funds raised are usually distributed to various countries where food parcels are purchased and distributed to the poor on the day of Eid Al-Fitr.

## Zakat - Pakistan fund

This fund consists of monies raised for humanitarian support in Pakistan.

## Yemen fund

The Yemen fund consists of monies raised for humanitarian support in Yemen.

#### Roof Project fund

The roof project fund raised money to support refurbishment of the roof at the mosque.

## Pakistan Appeal fund

The Pakistan Appeal fund consists of monies raised for humanitarian support in Pakistan.

#### Imed Dfib fund

Working together with IMED, this fund was set up to raise money to buy two defibrillators to support the local community.

### Deaf Appeal fund

This fund consists of monies raised for helping people suffering from deafness.

#### Scouts fund

The Scouts fund was set up to collect income for the scouts group.

This fund was fully expended as at 31 December 2019.

## Salaries fund

This fund was created to collect donations given specifically to support wages and salaries of masjid employees.

#### East Africa fund

This fund was created to provide humanitarian support after multiple countries in East Africa were severely affected by drought and conflict.

### **Emergency Appeal fund**

This fund was created to support a lady in Syria who had been blinded following a missile attack in Syria. The monies raised are being used to support treatment to recover her eyesight via multiple operations.

## Syrian Orphans fund

The fund was created to support setup of the largest Syrian Orphanage in Turkey, housing and providing care for approximately 240 orphans.

#### **GLISK Admission fund**

The fund was created to manage funds for Green Lane Institute of Sacred Knowledge, providing Arabic Language and Islamic Studies education.

This fund was fully expended as at 31 December 2019.

This fund is used to capture zakat donations in respect of Task Force GLM projects.

## Pakistan Water Appeal fund

This fund was created to set up sustainable sources of clean water in Pakistan.

## Kashmir Earthquake Appeal fund

This fund was created to collect monies to help with the aftermath of an earthquake which occurred in Kashmir during 2019.

#### **GLM Educational Trust fund**

The GLM Educational Trust fund represents funds of the charity controlled by the charitable company and consolidated into these financial statements.

#### Youth and Children fund

The Youth and Children fund represents fund of the charity controlled by the charitable company and consolidated into these financial statements.
